

## PE and Sport Premium Impact Statement 2022/23





The school will receive approximately <u>£19,180</u> in Sports Premium funding for the academic year 2022-2023, which comes directly from the central government. It is designed to improve the quality of sports provision in school and to encourage more pupils to participate in sports related activities.

The school has chosen to spend the money in the following ways:

- £50 for our Year 5 and 6 football team to participate in the Herald Cup.
- £17,345 on employing a sports coach to support sporting activities and to develop teacher's knowledge across a variety of sports, as well as working with year 5 children towards creating a leadership academy and running active play sessions during both KS1 and KS2 lunchtimes every day.
- £2,000 on running after school sports clubs for pupils in all year groups
- £905 towards transport costs for school minibus


