Key achievements 2023-2024

To increase the number of children engaged in sport	All children in Years 1-6 able to engage in a range of sports, older children having opportunities to take a leading role and support younger children as well as their peers	Children reported that they are keen to be active at lunchtimes
To increase the number of children engaged in swimming	Year 3 children (and their parents) more keen to engage in swimming and develop skills that will lead to future swimming success	Resistance from parents to let children swim was addressed by hiring a smaller pool with a dedicated coach working just for our school, children in with smaller groups, and providing transport. This was successful with all but 2 children in Year 3, and should encourage with children and parents to engage more with swimming in Year 4.
To engage targeted children in sports activities after school hours with some joining competitive sports events	Success in local tournaments and leagues for football and netball for both girls and boys Recognition of participation and success celebrated in whole school assembly – children feeling proud, others feeling inspired to be part of school sport	Children were enthusing about their sporting success for months afterwards, pupil voice: "I can't believe we did it" "my mum was so proud of me" Younger child "I want to be in the team when I'm older"

Swimming Data

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	31%	This cohort were impacted by parents being reluctant to allow their children to swim in the local pool post-Covid. 3 x IYCA children who joined as non-swimmers 2 x PA missed swimming lessons 9 x SEN children (incl 6 x EHCP) who could not access swimming lessons
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	40%	Even though some children cannot swim for 25m, they did show an ability to swim in a range of strokes with good technique
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What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able	50%	Children showed greater confidence with self-
to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based		rescue.
